When Crosby Willette was diagnosed with Hemophilia A (severe) and Von Willebrand Disease (Type 1), it was a complete surprise to his mother, Kelli Birk. GLHF helped the family meet some of those challenges so that Crosby could live a life without limits. Crosby has grown from being a young camper at Camp Klotty Pine in 2014 — where he was surprised



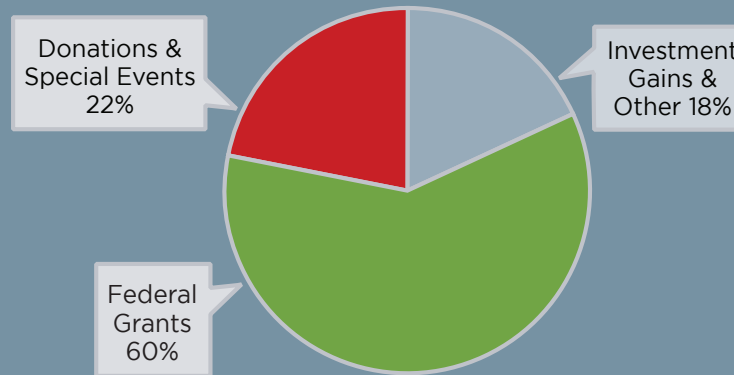
how many kids there had bleeding disorders — to advocating at Washington Days and becoming a Leader-In-Training at camp in 2022. He's a role model for younger kids with bleeding disorders and says, "I would like others to know that just because you have a bleeding disorder, doesn't mean you can't live a normal, happy life. There may be challenges, but everyone has challenges." Crosby and his mom are using their voices to advocate and teach others. Because of their efforts, the future for people with bleeding disorders continues to look bright.
